the village of Hudson Falls, New York. This will be ESCV's first time walking in this village of 8,000 people located on the east side of the Hudson River a short distance away from Glens Falls. The route will pass by an amazing patch of blooming squills on the lawn of a lovely Victorian home on Pearl St. The date of the walk was specifically chosen to coincide with this event.

Originally a small sleepy village known as Sandy Hill, Hudson Falls grew in size and importance in the 1830's with the opening of the Glens Falls Feeder Canal to the Champlain Canal which connected the Hudson River with the Champlain Canal. The sleepy village became a prosperous mill center producing lumber and other products. The Glens Falls Feeder Canal closed to commercial traffic in the 1930's and the entire length is now a 14 mile long walking and bike trail along the old tow path. The 10k route will walk on parts of this tow path. The 5k route will be on village



streets passing the historic coal silos built in 1906 using cement blocks invented by Griffin Lumber. Each silo held a different grade of coal. The route finishes in the small historic district of the village green bordered by late Victorian commercial buildings including the newly restored Strand Theater.

Trail Tips

It's a daunting exercise to think about all the tasks necessary to stage a successful walk. We are so fortunate that ESCV has a huge repertoire of walks for us to enjoy. This is due to the fact that over the years many members have practiced to become experts in all the stages of planning an event. **Before October 2015. ESCV had never had an** official Trail Master, but after completing the necessary requirements, I now hold that title. What does a Trail Master do? Ask yourself this question: If someone new to this area were to visit, what historic, scenic and/or cultural places would I want them to see and learn about? That's how it all begins! After carefully packing our suitcases with light-weight warm weather clothes, we hurriedly swapped for warmer clothing more suitable for late fall. Boy, was it cold in northern Florida that weekend- 39 degrees in the morning and low 40's during the day with some fierce winds! Volkswalkers, however, as we know, are never deterred by weather – we plan for it, we dress for it, we embrace it. Despite the weathermen fooling us, Louise and I had a fun-filled, wonderful weekend while trying to stay warm.

Every aspect of the 5 planned walks by the **First Coast Walking Club** was planned perfectly – the Meet and Greet, the luncheon, the sign-in process, the accurate maps and directions, the attentive, enthusiastic and fun club staff who were our walk leaders, as well. Many Volkswalkers who attended this event seemed to know each other from past walks and tours around the country. Louise was very popular and introduced me to many friends she had met during her travels.

Our walks in Amelia Island were varied. We walked on boardwalks alongside and over sand dunes, through woods, along paths and quaint city streets with mystical Spanish moss hanging from the trees, past historical homes, past a fort and on the lovely Amelia Island beaches. I can still envision the 4 right whales breaching in the waters off of Fernandina Beach, and the dolphins leaping playfully from the channel between Amelia and Cumberland Islands. During our afternoon cruise, we also spotted small herds

of wild horses and a wild, feral pig as well as many white pelicans (Have you ever seen one of those?), and an eagle high up in a tree looking content after just finishing his meal of fresh fish.

Each beach we walked along had its own aura





and beauty. My favorite and possibly everyone's was **Boneyard Beach.** Dead, dried, bleached out and washed-up remnants of trees and branches that were lay scattered on the beach giving it a spooky, eerie appearance. I don't think any of us would have dared to walk this beach at night under a full moon. Those driftwood shadows would surely frighten us to death. **Bony, bony, bony bones.** . .**American Beach**, a historic African American beach community in the past, still exists as a tribute to those who settled in this area during the segregation era of the 1930's. At that time African Americans were prohibited from using "white" beaches. Their original church and some of their original cottages still remain and some are still inhabited by the same family descendants.

The downtown area of Amelia Beach is charming with its many boutique shops, cafes, restaurants, repurposed train depot which is now a visitor center and pirates! In fact, the Palace Saloon, which is the first bar ever in the state of Florida and its oldest has a pirate at its entrance. Amelia Island is also noted as the birthplace of the modern shrimping industry.

Did you know that the charming house that was depicted in the Pippy Longstocking movie is located Amelia Island?

I just finished reading a book called **LIONS IN WINTER** with its setting in Amelia Island. There are others as well – fiction, non-fiction and historical fiction.

As you can see, Louise and I thoroughly enjoyed our weekend here on Amelia Island. Of course, we topped it off with a delicious seafood dinner. **A perfect way to end our trip!**

IVV OLYMPIAD / IML 2023: The big event is upon us. If you haven't already done so, there's still time to register for any or all of the festivities from February 19 – 26, 2023. The website is <u>IVV Olympiad 2023</u>. Last count, there were 25 countries, 40 US states and 1,000 people expected for San Antonio. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity to mix with the internationals, but at a reduced rate because it's all happening in your own country.

<u>CAPE COD WEEKEND</u>: Looking for an adventure between Mother's Day and Memorial Day? Attend the Cape Cod Weekend May 19-21, 2023, hosted by WalkNMass. I'm looking forward to group walks in Provincetown and Hyannis, and other walks such as Plymouth, and Oak Bluffs on Martha's Vineyard. And don't forget Quincy for you "Q" needers.

FEES: I understand that walk fee participation rates were last raised in 2003, with a maximum charge of \$3.00 for IVV Credit walkers. A simple Google search reveals that the present value of that \$3.00 is now \$4.92. AVA Chair Nancy Wittenberg plans on calling a Special AVA Board Meeting in early March to discuss fees. I would appreciate receiving Northeast club members' thoughts and suggestions that I could relay to the board for that meeting.
